

THE HOSTILITIES IN TUNIS.

FRENCH TROOPS UNDER THE WALLS OF
GOLETTA—BOU AMENA DISHEARTENED.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The *Morning Post* says: “England and Italy have resolved to send two more iron-clads to Tunis to protect their respective subjects, owing to the persistent complaints of residents.”

A Tunis dispatch says: “Two battalions of French troops and a battery of artillery have arrived, and will encamp a mile north of Goletta, overlooking the harbor. This may be said to be the first entry of French troops into the capital.”

GOLETTA, Aug. 3.—Two battalions of French troops and a battery of artillery have arrived here and been camped under the walls of the town.

TUNIS, Aug. 3.—A party of marauders, who pillaged a farm at Tonta and killed a Greek, were attacked by a loyal tribe and defeated with heavy loss.

The leader of the Sfax revolt recently entered Tripoli, but the authorities expelled him.

PARIS, Aug. 3.—The Saida correspondent of the *Temps* confirms the statement that Chief Bou Amena is disheartened, and says his forces are considerably diminished and that he does not intend taking the offensive. The inhabitants of Susa desire French occupation of that place in view of attacks by marauders. The deserters from the Tunisian Army who were brought back to Tunis have asked for pardon and have promised to serve the Bey faithfully.
