# Tunisia Quiet as 2,000 Arabs Rounded Up

TUNIS, Tunisia. Jan. 27 (UP)

French troops and police rounded up some 2,000 Arab nationalists today and conducted a house-to-house search for weapons in scattered localities throughout Tunisia.

Authorities reported only “minor incidents of sabotage during the second consecutive day of uneasy quiet in the Tunisian Nationalists’ violent campaign for home rule.

Habib Bourguiba, leader of the Nationalist Neodestour Party, warned, however, his followers may renew their attacks on “colonialism” unless France offers an “agreeable solution” during the present lull in the campaign. Bourguiba said in an interview “the present weekend calm in Tunisia is to give the French a chance to propose a solution to the present difficulties.

Bourguiba was interviewed at Tabarka, a fishing village 85 miles west of Tunis. His exile to Tabarka touched off an 11-day campaign of violence which began Jan. 16. At least 69

persons were killed in the rioting, more than 200 were wounded, and damages was quoted in the millions of dollars.

“Unless something is proposed within two or three days,” Bourguiba said, “the people of Tunisia may see fit to renew their attacks against French colonialism. We are only demanding autonomy in our purely internal affairs.”

Bourguiba appealed for American support for his Nationalistic movement and denied it was tinged with communism.

French authorities, meanwhile, reported a railroad bridge between Hencha and Sainte-Juliette, near Sfax, was blown up last night and other acts of sabotage had occurred in widely-scattered areas.

The French said also additional troops are being rushed to Tunisia aboard the French transport Sidi-Feruch which left Marseille Sunday morning with the 7<sup>th</sup> regiment of Spahis.
