Bombs in Tunis

TUNIS, May 17 (A.A.P.). -Tunisian army and police patrols last night occupied the east coast Arab city of Sfax after Nationalist leaders of the country's three million Arabs had again forecast a wave of bombing, riots and crop burning if France did not , grant them greater independence. The patrols, which checked the identities of all passersby at main points in the city, earlier discovered an unexploded bomb in the city's market-place.

They arrested several of a crowd of 50 people who began a demonstration and manhandled two plainclothes policemen.

A bomb which exploded in the electric transformer station in the Tunis suburb of El Ariana yesterday did little damage, it was reported to day.

But 13 of the 21 cinemas in Tunis were still closed following the explosion of a bomb in a crowded cinema washroom on Thursday.

REINFORCEMENTS

The Commander-in-Chief of Tunisia, General Garbay, has asked that reinforcements be sent quickly lest trouble spreads southward, it was reported here.

From Paris today the London "Daily Telegraph" correspondent reported that the U.S. has sent France a note urging her to carry out far reaching reforms in Tunisia quickly.

Failing this, the U.S. would be unable to abstain again when the Arab-Asian bloc next raised the question before the Security Council, the Note was reported to say.
